#### FEBRUARY: A MONTH FOR LOVE IN OPERA

February is the month for valentines, roses, and romantic getaways. It's also the month in which the Sarasota Winter Opera Festival begins. And this season, it is all about love. But don't be fooled – these love stories don't always have happy endings! But they all give us a fine valentine's gift: beautiful music.

Opening the season is Pietro Mascagni's *Cavalleria Rusticana*. First heard in Rome in 1890, this is a popular "verismo" opera — meant to be a harsh depiction of the real lives of real people in real unseemly situations. In this opera, a man (Turridu) loves another's wife (Lola, wife of Alfio). Turridu, is depressed when he learned Lola had married while he was away in the war, has his way with Santuzza, disgracing her. Santuzza loves Turridu, but he still has eyes for Lola. Alfio challenges Turridu, and in the end the villagers hear a gun shot and that Turridu has been killed. Here is "Oh, Lola, as pretty as the smiling flowers..." sung by Turridu in Act I. On a happier note, we'll also hear Gioachino Rossini's *Barber of Seville* and Mozart's *Marriage of Figaro* beginning in February. Both of these works are based on plays by French playwright Pierre Beaumarchais.

In *Barber of Seville* we meet Count Almaviva who is enamored of the beautiful Rosina. However, he wants to win her over as an average guy (Lindoro), not as a count, since he fears she will love him for his money and status. Barber and jack of all trades Figaro is there to help the Count with several disguises and humorous plots that lead, in the end, to the marriage and "happily ever after" for the Almaviva family. (Well, until the next opera!)

Here is one of the love songs from the Act I of the opera, "Ecco ridente in Cielo" sung by Andrew Stenson. The Count is singing to Rossina's balcony

window, hoping the woman he loves will appear. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=LLtuG1grr o

Fast forward, and it's a few years later. The count and countess are an "old married couple" (probably in their 20s). In Mozart's The Marriage of Figaro we learn that the count is unfaithful and wants to seduce Figaro's intended, Susanna. Susanna, Figaro, and the countess design several ways to trick the count into seeing the error of his ways, as the countess truly does love the rogue. Here the countess laments how her marriage has been going badly, but her true love for the count inspires her to do something about it. The final opera of the 2025 Winter Opera Festival centers on love and forgiveness. Giuseppe Verdi's *Stiffelio*, which premiered in 1850 in Trieste, is about an adulterous relationship involving a preacher's wife. Verdi's man of God finds out about the affair, struggles with what to do in terms of revenge, and then delivers his ultimate message of forgiveness from the pulpit. 

Two operas, two betrayed husbands, two tragic ends. In *Cavalleria rusticana* the calm of a Sicilian Easter morning is broken by a betrayed lover who sets off a chain of events ending in violent tragedy. In true theatrical tradition *Pagliacci*'s clown tries to go on the show, but his real -life humiliation and despair lead to a grim climax. The violent passions and raw emotions of these two works changed the direction of Italian opera forever.

The distressed couple, along with Rosina (now the Countess Almaviva) conspire to reveal the count's lechery, despite the many obstacles thrown in their way. Mozart's musical genius, along with Lorenzo DaPonte's witty libretto make *The Marriage of Figaro* one of opera's masterpiece.
